4. Chair's Report (Luger)

Welcome; name plates; hired a new admin asst. Betsy Kienitz who begins on Sept. 11

5. Administrative Reports:

President's Office (Feinstein): First day enrollment numbers – down 128 Freshmen (6.6%), graduate up 85 students (10%); retention and graduation rates – overall enrollment down 5.6%; FTE down less; Retention rates were at 73% positive, the highest projection in over 16 years; 4-year grad rate 35.5 % - up a few points from last year – highest in 24 years; 52.2% 6year grad rate – highest in 22 years; Overall, the budget shows a deficit projected this year to be at \$2.7 million, most of which is due to the drop in housing and dining services that
