## APC charged UGC to determine which degrees to award, 8/29/2022

Purpose: HB 21-1330 enables four-year institutions to award but not deliver AA degrees. Under the bill, all degrees require 70 credits total and at least 15 from us, and all of the credits must have already been completed by the student (we cannot require them to take any additional credits to earn the associates degree), and the student must not have established residency at any community college. There are minimum requirements for each degree type; we have the option to set additional requirements.

**Rationale:** Participation is optional, but UNC has signaled through participation on state working group that we will participate. Participation is consistent with our focus on serving traditionally underserved populations and ensuring they earn a credential and supports career readiness. Most other state institutions have signaled definite interest in participating. Outreach to eligible students affords us with an opportunity to recruit them back to complete a four-year bachelor's degree. This is strongly supported by the CDHE, CCHE and Governor's office.

The state has arranged to submit (and pay for) a "batch" application to HLC on behalf of all participating 4yrs who need HLC approval to offer AA degrees. The state has additional one-time monies which they have promised to allocate to offset operational costs. Many students may be eligible to receive awards from more than one 4yr institution, so it makes sense to be on the front end if we participate.
